Dear Parents

We have made it to the end of the first week of term and I would first of all like to say well done. The response to the home learning has been excellent but I know that this has not been easy. There is a balance to be had in terms of the work set because every child is different and all home circumstances are different. I think we are getting the balance right but it is very much a balance. I am in contact with other headteachers and the queries and concerns about home learning are the same in every school. That's because the pressure on parents and staff is the same everywhere.

However it becomes increasingly frustrating that the government does not recognise this. I have no answer to what should be done instead but continue to be fearful for the safety of the children and staff in school as well as the education of all the children generally. I do not think there are many headteachers that could say that they feel supported by the government at this time and there is a worry that something will have to give. We have been informed that on Wednesday there were over 21,500 key worker and vulnerable children in schools across Kent compared to approximately an average of 5000 during the last 'closure' in May, whilst at the same time the expectation for home learning within the statutory guidance is much higher during this closure. If the numbers increase it will be interesting to see how schools are able to manage both. Then again perhaps we should look at this in a different way and seeing how hospitals are at breaking point with Covid cases reminds us how lucky we are to be healthy and well as well as demonstrating how we must all try so hard to reduce the social contact we have and follow the restrictions set.

I apologise for that rather bleak opening to a letter, it was hardly uplifting after a difficult week. I hope you are all well. We are all missing the children and really don't want you or the children to forget that you all remain part of the school community. If we can help with anything please contact us. So many of you have already and it fills me with pride that we are a place that you can come to when times are tough. Please tell the children that we are missing them and that we are proud of the way they are coping. Hopefully they have been working hard and I hope they are remembering the values that mean so much to us.
