

Pupil Premium Grant Expenditure

2020/21 Academic Year

The Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) is money sent to school based on the numbers of pupils in the school who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) or those who have been eligible for FSM within the last 6 years (Ever 6). In addition, Children in Care (CiC) receive Pupil Premium funding. This money is allocated to initiatives to ensure pupils reach their full potential, both academically and socially.

Strategy for PPG expenditure 2020/21

We have a total of 45 children eligible for PPG funding in 2020/21. This totals £66,525.00.

Summary of Barriers to Learning

These barriers do not affect all PP children at Boughton-under-Blean & Dunkirk Methodist Primary School.

- Low attainment on entry to the school- both in Reception and for our mobile pupils
- Poor emotional wellbeing
- Lower attendance
- A large number of PP pupils are also on the SEND register
- Chaotic home life
- Low parental aspirations and expectations of attainment
- Poor parental engagement with the school
- Lack of enrichment activities outside of school compared to non PP children due to financial constraints or lack of opportunities
- Lack of exposure to high quality language, both spoken and written

How strategies are identified

When making decisions on how to use our pupil premium funding grant effectively we have made use of a range of research, most prominently the Education Endowment Foundation's Teaching and Learning Toolkit. In addition, we work collaboratively to investigate practice in other schools and evaluate the effectiveness of our previous years' spending. Our strategies aim to deploy staff effectively to meet individual learning needs and are, where possible, data driven in response to evidence.

Effective strategies used include:

- Access to quality first teaching
- Effective deployment of staff
- Mastery learning
- One to one tuition
- Oral language interventions
- Parental involvement
- Reading comprehension strategies
- Small group tuition
- Social and emotional learning

Item/Project Proposed for 2020/21

Subsidise cost of after school clubs (when these resume)
Targeted teaching for English and Maths by skilled teaching assistants in all classes for PPG pupils to accelerate progress
Subsidise school educational day trips (when these resume)
Family Liaison Officer 3 days a week to support PPG children with attendance, social difficulties and emotional difficulties to promote engagement with their learning and thereby accelerate progress (75% of FLO time on disadvantaged pupils)
Training for all staff about children's mental health to support the return to school for all pupils
Purchase of additional resources such as online platforms to support learning e.g. Mathshed, White Rose
Provide targeted intervention groups across all year groups for identified PPG pupils to accelerate progress and raise attainment following reviews at pupil progress meetings during afternoon lessons.
Provide milk at playtimes for all PPG pupils
Formal assessment of specific additional needs
Subsidise cost of special events such as Bikeability in Y5 and Y6
Targeted intervention for those pupils transitioning to secondary school
Total = £69,058.55
