

Topics Overview

English - We will use a range of texts this term, all with a World War II theme to link to our history topic. Texts will include 'Sam's Spitfire Summer', 'The Little Ships' and a range of Blitz themed poetry. Genres of writing will include journalistic writing, recount, narrative, discussion and instructions. We will also complete regular spelling practice, grammar work, handwriting practice and spelling work. Extended writing sessions will take place regularly to ensure we have a wide range of evidence to support teacher assessment for writing.

Maths - Topics this term will include place value up to 10 000 000; values of decimal digits; multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and 1000; conversion between units of measurement; rounding; co-ordinates in all 4 quadrants; and order of operations (BODMAS). We will also complete investigative and problem solving activities, arithmetic sessions and times tables practice. As the children have missed aspects of the Y5 curriculum, we will be trying to 'fill the gaps' as much as possible as we go along.

Science - Our topic for this term is 'Living Things and their Habitats'. During this time, the children will explore and practice classifying micro-organisms, plants and animals.

R.E - This term the children will look at what matters most to Christians and Humanists.

P.E - This term the children will have PE on a **Wednesday** (circuits/fitness with Mrs Fulton) and **Thursday** (football with Mr Warner). The children should come into school in their PE kit on these days. PE kit should consist of a plain red T-shirt, plain black shorts/tracksuit trousers and trainers. It would be useful to bring in black plimsolls for any indoor sessions that may happen due to adverse weather - these could be left in school on their peg. If your child wears stud earrings, please remind them that these need to be removed for lessons or covered with micropore. Any children with long hair must make sure it's tied up/back before the session - please provide a hair tie in these cases.

Computing - We will begin with a short unit in which the children learn some basic coding skills, enabling them to create their own game. We will then continue to develop our coding skills through a range of activities on Purple Mash using 2Code.

Art/D.T. - This term the children will be looking at 'skyline art' and will use the influence of WW2 and The Blitz to inspire their own artwork in this area.

History/Geography - During our Humanities sessions this term, we will focus on a local study looking at the impact of World War II in the area. We will focus on evacuation, Operation Dynamo, the Battle of Britain, rationing and Operation Fortitude.

PSHE - This term our topic is 'how can we stay healthy?' During these sessions, the children will spend time learning and discussing what positively and negatively affects health, lifestyle and wellbeing.

French - Our unit 'Notre Ecole' (our school) focuses on places around school, school subjects, time and describing teachers.

Music - This term we will be looking at '90s Music' and consider key influences, styles and musicians of the decade.



Home Learning

This year, home learning will be focused on developing key skills that are both manageable at home and important in supporting children's progress.

Although home learning books will be sent home next week, they are not to be returned but rather used as a book to practise and work in at home. As we are trying to avoid potential issues with items travelling between home and school, we've had to make this change to how we use these books.

Home learning tasks will be:

Spellings

As before, each week the children will have a list of spellings on a **Thursday** that need to be practised and learnt for a test the following **Tuesday**. The children can practise in any way they find beneficial, recording in wherever they like.

Times tables

The children should be regularly practising their times tables and any arithmetic strategies they recognise they need to develop. Arithmetic is an important aspect of maths and hugely supports learning within the classroom.

Reading

I cannot over-emphasise the importance of daily reading practice for children at home. Please do encourage and support your child with this. Fifteen to twenty minutes per day is ideal or as often as possible would be fantastic. The children will be encouraged to record any reading in their record books and any parental comments are always appreciated.

Unfortunately, we're not in a position to send reading books from our class library home at the moment. This means the children need to have a book in school and a book at home that they are reading on a regular basis.

Additional tasks

Any children wishing to complete additional tasks can undertake research based activities on any topics being studied in class. These can be recorded in their homework books or could be presented in a presentation document and uploaded to *Google Classroom*.
